## Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial

- "We shall overcome because the arc of the moral universe is long, but it bends toward justice."

- "I believe that unarmed truth and unconditional love will have the final word in reality. This
  is why right, temporarily defeated, is stronger than evil triumphant."

- Walk around one of the pool. Walk at a natural pace and do not stop.








## National 9/11 Memorial

## **Emotion and Body Flight**

- When you are in the tunnel, the wind rushes up toward and supports you against gravity, and you don't fall. This is called terminal velocity. After you experience the experiment with the terminal velocity of the balls, guess your terminal velocity.

- To what extent are the rights of all Americans protected today?










### **Imagination**




## Imagination: Role-Playing

Share the story of George Washington and the escape of his slave cook, Hercules.








#### The Presidents House

Students take on the role of Hercules and George Washington.




- Hercules, why would you want to run away from the General when has been so good to you?



Have you ever felt discriminated because of your religious beliefs?








## Memory and the Four Freedoms

Have you ever been afraid? Not of a scary movie, but of something real? Why do we have so much security screening?










## Memory: Knowledge & Values

- What do you think is the role of the government in protecting your speech and religion, for providing for your basic needs, and keeping you safe?








#### Faith

## Faith: Monument Valley



- One of six Navajo-owned tribal parks
- Home to up to 100 Navajo people
- Called Tsé Bii Ndzisgaii, or "Clearing Among the Rock" by the Navajo.
- Regarded as an enormous hogan, or dwelling, with the two isolated stone pinnacles to the north as its door posts.
- The two soaring buttes known as the Mittens are believed to be the hands of a deity.

- Many Westerns have been filmed in Monument Valley. How might the films influence the way we view the land?










#### Intuition
