## **The LCP combines these five program components:**

- 1) Micro-finance
- 2) Language acquisition
- 3) Place-based education
- 4) Environmental education
- 5) Vocational education



# Two Roads Project



## **The Two Roads Project:**

- 1) Volunteers are asked to take on a project that could change their lives.
- 2) Volunteers are then each given \$100 and asked to better their community or beyond.
- 3) Students have to grow their money and then use the money for a service project of their choice.
- 4) Students have to work independently of adults.
- 5) 90 days after receiving the money students must give an account of how they “grew” their money, what they did for their service project, how many people they impacted as a result of their community service project, and finally how the TRP affected them.

Accept the fact that you are an outsider and have a limited understanding of the problems the people you are helping face.

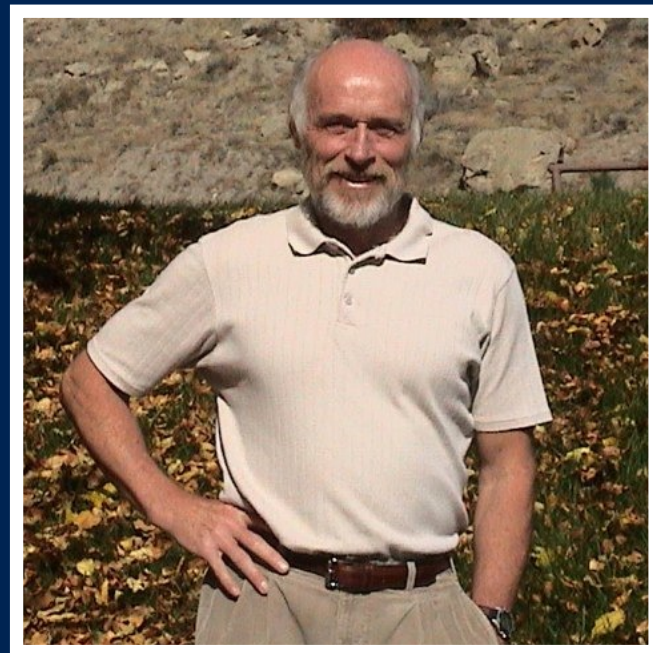
Understand that the word
